
Aims & Objectives



Adab & Akhlaq



"Indeed, Allah bestowed a favour on the believers when He raised in their midst a Messenger from among themselves — who recites to them His verses, **purifies them**, and teaches them the Book and **wisdom.** For indeed, they had previously been clearly astray." (3:164)

One of the overarching goals of the mission of the Prophet (2) was to **purify souls and refine character.** He (2) said: "I was sent to perfect good character" (Aḥmad). Akhlāq (character) and ādāb (etiquettes) are not 'extras' or 'niceties' — rather they are fundamental aspects of the dīn, and determine a person's eternal destiny.

The Best Example

The Prophet ^(M) had the best character. The greatest testimony of his character comes from the Lord of the heavens and the earth Himself:

"And you are truly (a man) of outstanding character." (68:4)

The goal of Qurānic Tarbiyah is to nurture children to 'live' the Qur'ān. The Prophet did not merely teach his companions how to recite the Qur'ān beautifully. Rather, **'his character was the Qur'ān'** and he nurtured exemplary character in his Companions, young and old.

Thus, it is vital that alongside teaching our children to recite the Qur'ān, we teach them how to embody its teachings, and we instil in them excellent akhlāq. One of the most powerful means of achieving this is by **learning and reflecting on the Prophetic example.** Doing this will also increase our love and īmān in him .

Children should be inspired to follow the Prophet ⁽²⁾ as their role model, and to follow his Sunnah in every aspect of their lives, be it how he ate, drank, interacted with others, prayed, and remembered Allah.

Contemporary Challenges

Today, morality is seen as being relative. Value and morals are constantly shifting, causing havoc to our collective well-being.

In the midst of our confusion, we look around for solutions to our problems, but fail to realise that the best value system is the Divine system sent to the Prophet .

Children have an exceptional capacity to absorb information and learn from their surroundings, be it the home, school and especially via the screen. Often, the values they are exposed to are immoral, ego-centric and have led to the disintegration of families and communities. It is vital that we proactively counteract these influences, and instead fill the hearts and minds of our young ones with the love of Allah and the **Prophetic way of 'being'**.

Our children must be anchored by divine guidance. They should be guided by the Qur'ān and Sunnah, and feel immensely fortunate that they have been gifted the best moral compass.

Learning by Example

As educators, we should constantly engage in the purification (tazkiyah) of our souls and always strive to improve our own character. Children learn by example, and it is vital that they do not see a discrepancy between our own character and what we 'teach' them about Prophetic character.

Good Company

By being in the company (suhbah) of the Prophet ^(*), his Companions absorbed the best way of being. They learned and adopted his lofty characteristics and they were purified from negative traits. Upright character is learnt through the company we keep, and as educators, we should try to foster an environment which facilitates this.

Iman & Adab with Allah

Children should be motivated to practise good character as an important means to seeking the pleasure and love of Allah [®].

The scholars have mentioned that the first step to changing behaviour is to activate īmān. If we focus merely on outward poor behaviour, this may leave a negative impact on the heart. Instead we should focus on īmān so that children can learn to love what Allah loves, and hate what Allah hates. This does not mean that we should not correct unwanted behaviours — but rather we should do so with sensitivity and kindness.

Along with learning how to treat and honour Allah's creation in the best way, children should be taught about having **'adab' with Allah.** This is more important in our times where secularism, atheism and materialism are aggressively being propagated globally.

United Ummah

Character building requires time and patience. Tarbiyah is a long and gradual process. A character trait or behaviour must be rehearsed for some time before it becomes an intrinsic quality. Educators are encouraged to give children ample opportunities where they can practise these lofty qualities. In addition to this, educators are encouraged to create a space where children truly experience the value of an environment that upholds the Sunnah: a place where they are cherished, valued and nurtured.

We ask Allah [®] to guide us to the best character, as He is the Only One who can do this. We ask Him to make us vehicles of true transformation in the Ummah. May we treat our children with love, kindness and gentleness, so that they can become powerful building blocks of a united Ummah.

About This Book

The Adab & Akhlaq Level 3 book aims to nurture exemplary akhlāq (character) and refined ādāb (etiquettes) in young hearts through the timeless example of our beloved Prophet Muhammad . This book consists of 25 fun and engaging lessons about the perfect ādāb and akhlāq of the Prophet . It explores his noble conduct towards others and how he handled emotions with incredible grace. The book concludes with a focus on the power of dhikr and du'ā.

The book has been prepared for Year 3 children, typically aged 7-8, but it can also benefit older children. Whilst this book can be used as a standalone textbook, the impact is likely greater for children who have previously completed Adab & Akhlaq Levels 1 and 2, laying a solid foundation for their spiritual growth.

Whilst using this book as a teaching resource, feel free to adapt the lessons to make them as **engaging** and as **relevant** as possible. It is important that children have positive associations and happy memories with their Islamic Studies learning. The book contains nashid pages, specifically chosen to correspond to the topics being taught. Supplement the lessons with engaging stories, and craft activities where logistically possible.

Along with this, '**Learning for Life With Allah**' (LLWA) pages have been added to make learning practical. Knowledge is nothing but ink on paper until it is translated into real-world application, and tarbiyah is the process that enables that application.

Every textbook has its limitations. Textbooks are one of the many tools which can be used to educate our children. What is more important is how the teachings and ideals of the Qur'ān and Sunnah are translated into practice, in our own lives as educators and in the lives of our young learners. We encourage educators to **nurture a Qur'ānic environment** within their learning institutions and homes to make this a reality inshaAllah.

How To Use This Book

O Learning Objectives

The key aims and outcomes of the lesson are clearly listed at the beginning of the lesson. A traffic light system helps outline the differentiated learning outcomes.


On your mark! – This is a **beginner** level objective which all learners should be able to access and engage with.

Get set! – This is an intermediate level objective which all learners should be able to take part in, although some students may need extra support.


Go! – This is the **advanced** or higher-order objective that most learners will be able to engage with to some level, although some learners may need support to express their ideas in writing.

Thinking Starters

Educators are encouraged to write the question on the board before the start of the lesson. As learners walk into the classroom, they should start to think about the question or discuss it with a peer. Learners do not need to write down the answer. It will be used to set the scene for the lesson.



Learners can memorise short Qur'ānic verses, hadiths and du'ās to help them internalise the teachings of the dīn. The key words will develop student literacy and expand their vocabulary. Educators are encouraged to do spelling tests and play word games with their class once a week/every 2 weeks to assess learning.



Learners should self-reflect and share their reflections with their educator or their peers. Answers don't need to be written down.

I Act On What I Learn

This is an important part of the lesson where the learners can transform their learning to action. Educators should follow up in the next lesson by asking learners if they managed to act upon the prompt.

P Progress Check

Educators should end the lesson by reviewing the learning objectives and using a plenary. At the end of every lesson, learners should check which learning objectives they learnt and understood, and clearly identify what they don't know. The educator can do a quiz, test or even play a game with the class using these evaluation questions. Learners can write the answers or just say the answers verbally to the educator.

It's Story Time!

Educators should read the story before the lesson, and narrate it within the lesson to the learners in an engaging manner (using facial expressions, hand gestures, change in tone of voice, asking questions etc). 


How Can I Improve My Character?

Trustworthiness

Amanah (أَمَانَةُ) is the Arabic word for trust. In the Qur'an, Allah describes the believers as:




"Those who honestly look after their trusts and promises." (Surah al-Mu'minun: 8)

What does 'look after their trusts' mean? It means:

- Doing everything Allah has ordered you to do e.g. making sure you pray salah on time.
- Looking after the 'trusts' of other people e.g. taking care of something precious that someone has left with you.

So now, what do you think 'trustworthy' means?



My Prophet Was 'al-Amin'

Even before our beloved Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم became a Prophet, he was famously known in Makkah as 'as-Sadiq': the truthful and **'al-Amin': the trustworthy.** This was because he always told the truth and he never **betrayed** the trust of anyone.

A noble lady of Makkah called Khadijah hired the Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم to do business on her behalf. She was so impressed with his honesty, good manners and trustworthiness that she decided to marry him!

After he became a Prophet, the disbelievers of Makkah did not believe in him. Yet, they would still leave their precious possessions with him, because they knew how trustworthy and honest he was.

Did You Know?

The words *iman*, *amanah* and *amin* all come from the same 3 letters: أ- م - ن

How Can I Be Trustworthy?

- 🔶 Ask Allah to make you a trustworthy person.
- 🔶 Say the truth and be honest.
- 🔶 If you make a promise, fulfil it.
- 🔶 Take care of people's belongings.
- If someone tells you a good secret, don't share it with others.
- 🔶 Worship Allah in the best way possible.



A Mercy to Mankind

Our beloved Prophet ملى الله عليه وسلم was sent as a **mercy (rahmah)** to mankind. Allah سبحانه وتعالى says in the Qur'an:

وَمَا أَرْسَلْنَكَ إِلَّا رَحْمَةَ لِّلْعَلَمِينَ

"We have sent you (O Prophet) only as a **mercy** for the whole world." (Surah al-Anbiya: 107) Rahmah: compassion, care, love, kindness and mercy.

The Prophet ملى الله عليه وسلم was a *rahmah* to those around him. This means that he was very kind and loving. He cared deeply for everyone and treated people in the best way possible. Not only was he kind to people, he was also very kind to animals, and even trees!

Muhammad ملى الله عليه وسلم was not only merciful to those around him. He was also very merciful to those people who had not even come into the world yet. He would always worry about his Ummah – me and you. He would spend a long time in sajdah crying and begging Allah to forgive his Ummah.



How Can I Be Merciful?







Our beloved Prophet Muhammad صلى الله عليه وسلم always wanted the best for everybody. He was kind, generous and loved to share. He taught us how to behave in the best way possible.

The Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم said:


لَا يُؤْمِنُ أَحَدُكُمْ حَتَّى يُحِبَّ لِأَخِيهِ مَا يُحِبُّ لِنَفْسِهِ

"None of you will have firm belief (iman) until he loves for his brother what he loves for himself." (Bukhari)

A true believer loves for his brother or sister what he loves for himself. And he also dislikes for others what he dislikes for himself. This hadith is not only about sharing objects or possessions. It is also about **treating others how you would like to be treated!**

IT'S STORY TIME! The Bond of Brotherhood

During the Battle of Yarmuk, Abu Jahm ibn Hudhayfah al-Adwi رضي الله عنه, a Companion of the Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم, found out that his cousin had been injured. He thought that if his cousin were alive, he would give him water to quench his thirst and wipe the dust from his face.

He found his cousin dropping in and out of consciousness. Upon catching a moment where his cousin was awake, he asked him: "Would you like some water?" His cousin nodded yes. Just then, they heard a sound. "Aaahhh..." –it was coming from another Companion who had been injured.

So his cousin indicated to Abu Jahm that he should go and give water to the other Companion first. Abu Jahm went to the other Companion and noticed that it was Hisham ibn al-Aas رضي الله عنه who had been injured. He asked him,

"Would you like some water?" Just then, they heard another Companion moaning from his injuries. Hisham indicated to Abu Jahm that he should go and give the water to the third Companion.

Abu Jahm then hurried to the third Companion. He was too late. The Companion had passed away.

He quickly hurried back to Hisham hoping to give him the water. Hisham had also passed away! He then immediately went back to his cousin to give him the water. He too had passed away!

Allahu Akbar! What an amazing example of **brotherhood** and **selflessness**!

IT'S STORY TIME! The Bedouin's Blunder

At the time of the Prophet من الله عليه وسلم, there were some people who lived in the desert (also known as Bedouins). They did not have much knowledge.

One day, a Bedouin man came to Madinah. He entered the Masjid of the Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم and he began to urinate in the corner of the Masjid. The Companions were horrified!

They rushed towards him and cried out, "Stop! Stop!"

However, the Prophet did something different. He was **the**

best of men المان الله عليه وسلم. He said to his Companions, "Leave him and let him finish."

He then instructed the Companions to pour water over it and told them, "You were sent to make things **easy**, and not to make things difficult."

Once the man finished urinating, the Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم went up to him and kindly explained to him that this was not something that should be done in the masjid. Afterwards, the Bedouin said, "The Prophet did not curse me, nor did he tell me off or hit me."

Allahu Akbar! Look how easygoing and gentle the Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم was.

My Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم Was Easygoing

Allah سبحانه و تعالى said to our beloved Prophet سرانه و تعالى said to our beloved Prophet

فَبِمَا رَحْمَةٍ مِّنَ ٱللهِ لِنتَ لَهُمْ وَلَوْ كُنتَ فَظًّا غَلِيظَ ٱلْقَلْبِ لَأَنفَضُّوا مِنْ حَوْلِكَ

"It is through Allah's mercy that you were gentle with them. Had you been harsh or mean-hearted, they would have certainly abandoned you." (Surah Al 'Imran: 159)

This means that being gentle and **easygoing** is one of Allah's gifts. Allah made the Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم easygoing, gentle and kind – and that is why his Companions loved him.

An **easygoing** person is calm and gentle; someone who does not get easily annoyed, worried or upset about things.



This may seem like a very small act, but this could save someone from slipping or from becoming badly injured. And you can't even imagine the reward Allah will give you in the Next World inshaAllah.

The Swift Response of Allah's Messenger صلى الله عليه وسلم

One night, the people of Madinah woke up, startled by a large bang. They felt very scared, thinking they were being attacked by enemies. Some of the Companions came out of their houses and started to walk towards where the noise came from.

To their surprise, they found the Messenger مىلى الله عليه وسلم returning on a horse. He had already t beaten them to it! The horse belonged to a a Companion called Abu Talhah رضي الله عليه وسلم. The Messenger مىلى الله عليه وسلم was riding it without a **saddle**.

Saddle: a seat fastened on the back of a horse or other animal, where a rider sits.

He had a sword around his neck and he began to comfort the people, "Don't be scared! Don't be scared!" It was just a false alarm! There was nothing to be afraid of.

He then said "I found it (the horse) to be superfast!" Before this incident, Abu Talhah's horse had been really slow, but due to the blessing of Allah's Messenger صلى الله عليه وسلم, it became very fast.

Riding a horse without a saddle is uncomfortable. He صلى الله عليه وسلم gave up his own comfort to help others.







The Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم would always wake up at night to perform extra prayers. He would pray for so long that his feet would become swollen. One of his Companions asked him, "Why do you do this when Allah has forgiven your past and future sins?" The Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم replied: "Shall I not be a grateful servant?"



So even though he did not have to, he would do this amazing worship to thank Allah!

Sadaqah

كُلُّ مَعْرُوفٍ صَدَقَةً


"Every act of goodness is sadaqah." (Muslim)

Sadaqah includes smiling at someone, helping a stranger, planting a tree, feeding an animal or removing a harmful object from a walkway.

These acts are all rewarded by Allah as acts of charity. We, too, should practise all these types of sadaqah. Allah has made it so easy for us to earn rewards!




- 🔶 To judge fairly between two people is a sadaqah;

Animals Are a Blessing From Allah


Animals are a blessing of Allah. Allah جلّ جلاله says:

وَٱلْأَنْعَامَ خَلَقَهَا لَكُمْ فِيهَا دِفْءٌ وَمَنَافِعُ وَمِنْهَا تَأْكُلُونَ

"And He created the cattle for you as a source of warmth, food, and (many other) **benefits.**" (Surah an-Nahl: 5)

Allah created animals for us so that we can benefit from them. Animals benefit us in many different ways. Animals provide us with food and drink. They also provide warmth for us as their skin and hair can be used to make clothes. They are also a means of transport.





The Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم Was Kind to Animals

The Prophet ملى الله عليه وسلم was sent as a mercy not just for humans, but the whole world! He treated animals in the best way. The animals loved the Prophet ملى الله عليه وسلم too!

The Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم taught the Companions رضي الله عليه وسلم to be good and kind to animals. He told them to be gentle with them and to not overwork them. He told them to feed them and give them water.

cannot be true believers if we hurt our neighbours. We should never trouble our neighbours in any way and we should always take care of them.

Imam Abu Hanifah & The Shoemaker



"Haya (modesty) is a part of iman." (Bukhari & Muslim)

Our Prophet ملى الله عليه وسلم dressed beautifully but his clothes were always simple, respectful and modest. He wore garments that were looselyfitted and not see-through. In this way, he made sure not to reveal the shape or skin of his body parts.

Our Prophet ملى الله عليه وسلم would also avoid dressing in any way that would show pride. He also told us that boys must not dress like girls and girls must not dress like boys, and we should not copy the dress styles of the disbelievers.




The **'Awrah**

Allah سبحانه وتعالى has instructed us to beautify ourselves and to cover our **'awrah** with the clothes that He has provided for us: **Awrah:** parts of the body that **must** be covered in front of others.





My Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم Was Mindful of His Tongue

Our beloved Prophet ملى الله عليه وسلم was always **mindful** of his tongue: he never lied, nor did he say hurtful words, nor did he speak about useless things. He ملى الله عليه وسلم said:

الْمُسْلِمُ مَنْ سَلِمَ الْمُسْلِمُونَ مِنْ لِّسَانِهِ وَيَدِهِ

"A Muslim is the one from whose tongue and hand the Muslims are safe." (Muslim)

This means that the 'true' Muslim is the one who does not hurt others with his words and his actions.



IT'S STORY TIME! The Insult and The Smile

One day, our beloved Prophet ملى الله عليه وسلم was sitting with some of his Companions. A man insulted Abu Bakr - رضي الله عنه – the Prophet's best friend. Abu Bakr remained silent and did not respond. The Prophet ملى الله عليه وسلم watched this and smiled. The man then insulted him again, but Abu Bakr رضي الله عنه remained silent. When the man insulted him the third time, Abu Bakr responded to him with a few words. At this point, the Prophet ملى الله عليه وسلم followed him and asked him: "Were you angry with me, Messenger of Allah?"

The Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم replied: "There was an angel with you who came down from the heavens. He was defending you and responding on your behalf. When you responded yourself, Shaytan came – and I was not going to sit with Shaytan!"





We Can't Take Back What We Say!

Our tongue is a part of our mouth that enables us to speak. It is a blessing from Allah سبحانه وتعالى. We should only use it for **righteous** words and we definitely shouldn't use it for words that would displease Allah.

Allah سبحانه و تعالى says in the Qur'an:

مَّا يَلْفِظُ مِن قَوْلٍ إِلَّا لَدَيْهِ رَقِيبٌ عَتِيدٌ

"He does not utter a single **word**, except that there is an observer with him, ready (to write it down)." (Surah Qaf: 18)

This means that everything we say is recorded by an angel.

Backbiting


Backbiting **(ghibah)** is to say something which is true about a Muslim that they would not like, behind their back (i.e. when they are not there). Backbiting is a very serious sin and it angers Allah. Allah سبحانه وتعالى says:

وَلَا يَغْتَب بَعْضُكُم بَعْضًا

"...And do not backbite one another..." (Surah al-Hujurat: 12)

Our Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم would never backbite. One day, one of his wives told him صلى الله عليه وسلم something about a man. He صلى الله عليه وسلم said, "I do not like to talk about a man, even if I were to get this or that." He meant that even if someone gave him so much money, he would still not like to say something bad about that man.

She then said, "Safiyyah is a woman who is ..." and she used her hand as if to indicate that she is short. So the Prophet which, if it were mixed in the water of the sea, it would **pollute** it." (Abu Dawud)



Did You Know?

It is not ghibah when you report someone for harming someone or something. It is our duty to stop others from doing wrong.

IT'S STORY TIME! Playground Whispers

Children are running, laughing, and playing together on the school playground. Ustadh Jamal calls Yusuf to the side to have a word with him. Adam whispers to Salih that he saw Yusuf taking a sweet from Ustadh Jamal's jar, and maybe he is speaking to him about that. Then, Yusuf and Ustadh Jamal go inside.



When the children line up at the end of break, Salih is standing behind Khadijah and he tells her what Adam told him about Yusuf. Some other children hear this and they all become


him about Yusuf. Some other children hear this and they all become curious, thinking badly of Yusuf. The gossip spreads like wildfire amongst the children in the class. Yusuf's other friends start avoiding him, whispering amongst themselves whenever he comes over. Yusuf overhears them speaking about him. He starts tearing up: he is hurt and confused, feeling lonely and unloved.


By the next day, Yusuf *loses his confidence*. He cries at the school gate, refusing to go into school. Adam and Salih watch regretfully from a distance, realising the *damage* their gossip has caused.

Later on, Ustadh Jamal tells the class, "I told Yusuf to take a sweet from my jar as he was feeling dizzy. Then, on the playground, I called him over to see if he was feeling better. He wasn't feeling better, so we came back inside where he could sit and take a rest." Adam and Salih are speechless and ashamed of themselves. It clearly wasn't what it seemed! *They wish they could take back what they said, but it isn't possible now*.

The children all apologise to Yusuf and express how they wish they hadn't believed what they were told. Adam and Salih admit that they had started the gossip. Yusuf forgives them, but he finds it very difficult to *trust* them again.



Bullying

Bullying is when you hurt anyone with your words or your hands. Laughing at others, pointing out faults in their clothes, commenting on their skin colour, and excluding them from a group is also bullying.

words or is abusive." (Bukhari)




Verbal name-calling, teasing and making fun of someone.

Name-Calling and Mocking

We are not allowed to call people by names they do not like or names which make them feel sad. The Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم would always call people with names that made them feel happy and loved.

Allah سبحانه وتعالى says: "O believers! Do not let men mock other men, they may be better than them, and do not let women mock other women, they may be better than them." (Surah al-Hujurat: 11) **Mocking:** Making fun of someone in a cruel way.

What Should I Do if Someone Is Being Bullied?

If we ever see someone else getting bullied, we should try to stop it. We can also stay near them or play with them to keep the bully away. We should advise the bully to stop or tell an older person. The Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم said:

"Allah will help His servant as long as the servant helps his brother." (Muslim)

Stealing Is Haram!

Stealing or **theft** means taking something that does not belong to you. Stealing is haram (unlawful) and a major sin. The punishment for stealing is mentioned by Allah in the Qur'an and it is very **severe**.

Allah الله tells us the punishment of the person who steals in the Qur'an:

Severe means something really serious or intense.

"Cut off the hands of the **thief**, male or female, as punishment for what they have done...* " (Surah al-Ma'idah: 38)

* This command is for the government of the Muslim lands.


Allah Is Always Watching

"Indeed Allah is Ever Watchful over you." (Surah an-Nisa: 1)




Trusting Allah's Choices

Sometimes we really, really want something, like a new toy or a special treat. But did you know that Allah knows what's best for us, even when we don't get what we want?

Allah الله عنه sees everything, even the things we can't see. So, when we ask for something and we do not get it, it is not because Allah doesn't care. It is because He knows what is best for us, even if we don't understand why at the time.

Stealing is never the right answer, even when we might feel sad or upset because we don't get what we want. Allah wants us to be honest. He wants us to be patient. He wants us to trust Him. He always knows what is best for us.

Fault-finding and finger pointing means looking for mistakes and faults instead of noticing what's **good.**



Not even 'Uff'!

Anas bin Malik رضي الله عنه was a young 10 years old boy when our beloved Prophet ملى الله عليه وسلم migrated from Makkah to Madinah. He was amongst the delighted children of Madinah who waited excitedly to welcome Muhammad صلى الله عليه وسلم.

When Muhammad ملى الله عليه وسلم arrived, everybody wanted to serve him. The mother of Anas bin Malik approached Muhammad ملى الله عليه وسلم while holding the hand of Anas, and she said, "O Messenger of Allah. I am a poor woman and I have nothing to offer you. This is my son; I am leaving him with you so he can help you and serve you. Please accept him." Muhammad ملى الله عليه وسلم her down.

Anas رضي الله عنه said, "I never felt any piece of velvet or silk softer than the palm of the Rasulullah صلى الله عليه وسلم, nor did I smell any fragrance more pleasant than the smell of Rasulullah صلى الله عليه وسلم. I served him for 10 years and he never said

'Uff' (an expression of dislike) to me. He never said 'Why did you do something?' for something I had done, nor did he ever say 'Why did you not do such and such' for something I had not done."

The Consequences of Looking for Faults in Others

When we look for faults in others:

- 🔶 🛛 We will lose friends.
- 🔶 Others will **distance** themselves from us.

"Do not get angry." (Bukhari)


The man wanted more advice, but each time the Prophet would give the same reply: "Do not get angry".

onthe Forbearance of the Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم

The Prophet ملى الله عليه وسلم did get angry at times – but it was always for the right reason and to please Allah. And even when he did get angry, he would not say bad words or throw things. He would **manage** his anger.


Imagine how angry you would be if somebody did that to you!

"Messenger of Allah, you cry too?" 'Abdur-Rahman asked with concern.


The Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم replied softly, "Ibn 'Awf! It is mercy."



Our beloved Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم taught us that when we are ill, we should ask Allah to cure us and make us feel better.

He also told us to take medicine and seek treatment.

Did You Know?

The Qur'an is the most powerful cure! The Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم would pray from the Qur'an and blow over himself when he was ill.

Allah is **ash-Shafi** (The Healer). Even if we think we were cured by medicine or the doctor, it was really Allah who cured us.

IT'S STORY TIME! A Powerful Du'a

There was a Companion whose name was 'Uthman ibn Abi al-'Aas رضي الله عنه. One day he came to the Prophet Muhammad صلى الله عليه وسلم and told him that since he had accepted Islam, he had been feeling pain in his body.

What do you think the Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم said to him?

The Messenger of Allah صلى الله عليه وسلم said to him: "**Put your** hand on the part of your body where you feel pain and say 'Bismillah' three times."



He then told him to recite the following du'a seven times:

أَعُوْذُ بِاللهِ وَقُدْرَتِهِ مِنْ شَرِّ مَا أَجِدُ وَأُحَاذِرُ

So ʿUthman صلى الله عنه did exactly as the Prophet صلى الله عنه told him to. Miraculously, Allah سبحانه وتعالى removed all of his pain and he felt much better!

After this, whenever any family member of 'Uthman ضيالله عنه, would fall ill, he would tell them to recite this special du'a that he had learnt from the Prophet ملى الله عليه وسلم.



The Most Beloved Places to Allah

The masjid is the house of Allah. Allah سبحانه وتعالى loves the masjid because it is a place where He is remembered.

"The most beloved places to Allah are the masajid." (Muslim) 'Masajid' is the plural of masjid.





The Etiquettes of the Masjid

Our beloved Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم taught us how we should behave in a masjid. Here are some of the etiquettes:

- 🔶 Dress appropriately.
- Ensure your mouth does not smell of something strong you have eaten e.g. onions.
- 🔶 Enter with the right foot and say the duʿa.
- 🔶 Leave with the left foot and say the du'a.
- + Pray two rak ahs when entering (also known as tahiyyatul-masjid).
- 👷 Do not talk about worldly matters.
- 🔶 Remain silent in the masjid.
- 🔶 Spend your time reciting Qur'an, praying salah and doing dhikr.
- 🔶 Reply to the adhan.





How Does Dhikr Affect My Heart?

Our beloved Prophet Muhammad صلى الله عليه وسلم loved Allah, and he loved to remember Him (do dhikr). When we remember Allah, we feel peaceful. We feel calm and we feel **content**.

Allah سبحانه وتعالى says:


أَلَا بِذِكْرِ ٱللهِ تَطْمَيِنُ ٱلْقُلُوبُ

"Truly it is in the remembrance (dhikr) of Allah that hearts find peace." (Surah ar-Raʿd: 28)

Dhikr is very powerful! Sometimes you might feel sad, scared or worried about something. Whenever this happens, do some dhikr, and you will definitely feel better.

Sometimes we may do or say bad things. This leaves black dots on our hearts and makes them dirty. When we do dhikr, it helps us to get rid of these black dots. Remembering Allah polishes the heart!




How Should I Do Dhikr?

Whenever we do dhikr, we should remember that Allah is hearing us and watching us. When we remember Allah, Allah remembers us.

We should try to reflect on the meaning of what we are saying so that

we can become closer to Allah. For example, when we say 'Alhamdulillah' (All thanks and praises are for Allah), we can think of all the different blessings and presents Allah gives us. For example, you can think: Thank you Allah for giving me my friends. Doing this will help us to enjoy dhikr.

It is best to make dhikr in a quiet place so we can **concentrate.** However, you can make dhikr in a noisy place too! ر اله

My Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم Loved Du ʿa

Morning Dhikr and Duʿa

We should do dhikr and duʿa at all times. However, Allah has given us a specific command to remember Him in the mornings and the evenings:

يَأَيُّهَا الَّذِيْنَ آمَنُوا اذْكُرُوا اللهَ ذِكْرًا كَثِيْرًا. وَسَبِّحُوْهُ بُكْرَةً وَأَصِيْلًا

"Believers, remember Allah often and glorify Him morning and evening." (Surah al-Ahzab: 41-42)

Our Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم would recite a collection of **adhkar** and du'as every morning and evening. We should try to copy him and recite as many as we can.

Adhkar: the plural of 'dhikr' which means remembrance of Allah.

Did You Know?

All of Allah's creation, including the animals and the mountains, remember Allah in the morning!



Task 1

Our beloved Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم told us to say this dhikr **3 times** in the morning:

صَبَحْتُ أَثْنَىٰ عَلَيْكَ حَمْدًا ، وَأَشْهَدُ أَنْ لَّا إِلَٰهَ إِلَّا اللَّهُ

I have entered the morning praising You, and I bear witness that there is no god worthy of worship but Allah. (Nasa'i)

In the above dhikr, we thank Allah, we praise Him and we also affirm tawhid. Do you remember the meaning of tawhid?

صلى الله عليه وسلم The Morning of Muhammad

After a long night in prayer, our beloved Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم often rested for a short time. When he would wake up, he would rub his eyes, clean his teeth with a siwak and say the waking up duʿa. He would perform wudu and prepare for salah. Then, he would listen intently to the Fajr adhan and repeat the sweet words after the muaddhin.

He would make his way to the masjid for fajr salah. He would stay there until sunrise. He would spend this time doing dhikr, making du'a, reciting Qur'an, and having **beneficial** conversations with the sahabah.

After sunrise, he would go home and greet his family. He would ask how they are and spend some time with them.

Beneficial: something that helps and produces good results.



Why Should I Do Dhikr and Du'a in the Morning?

You fulfil Allah's command and make Him pleased, Draw near to Him, stay blessed and eased.

You earn rewards and blessings that endlessly flow, Feel peace within, wherever you go.

You are protected from harm, from illness and **strife**, With dhikr and du'a as your shield in the journey of life.

You gain strength each day, for tasks great and small, With dhikr and du'a, you can complete them all.



The Effects of Sins

A sin is when we do something which displeases Allah and goes against His command. Each time we do something wrong, a black dot appears on our hearts, and our hearts become rusty. However, Allah is so Merciful that if we give up the sin and seek forgiveness from Him, He removes the dots and polishes our hearts. Our hearts then shine.


Allah is always ready to forgive us when we **sincerely** ask for forgiveness. He tells us:

وَٱسْتَغْفِرُواْ ٱللهَ إِنَّ ٱللهَ غَفُورٌ رَّحِيمٌ

"And ask Allah for forgiveness. Indeed Allah is **All-Forgiving,** the Most Merciful." (Surah al-Muzzammil: 20)

Sincerely: when you're not pretending and you really mean what you say. It comes from your heart and it is true.

What are the two names of Allah mentioned in the previous ayah? What do they tell us about Allah?



What is Istighfar?

Istighfar means saying sorry to Allah for any mistakes or wrongdoings that we have done. To ask His forgiveness, Allah teaches us a beautiful du'a in the Qur'an:

رَبِّ اغْفِرْ وَارْحَمْ وَأَنْتَ خَيْرُ الرَّحِيْنَ

My Lord, forgive and have mercy. You are the Best of those who are merciful. (Surah al-Mu'minun: 118)

Our Prophet صلى الله عليه وسلم stayed away from all sins. Even then, he would constantly do istighfar.



IT'S STORY TIME! Musa's Mighty Punch

One day, while Musa عليه السلام was wandering through the city, he saw two men fighting! The man being hurt was from his own people, the Banu Isra'il, and the one hurting him was an Egyptian, their enemy. Musa عليه السلام felt a surge of anger when he saw his fellow Isra'ili being oppressed - so he rushed to help him.

He stepped in to defend the Isra'ili and punched the Egyptian. The Egyptian fell to the ground and didn't get back up. He had died! Musa عليه السلام was so strong that, with one punch, he killed him.

Musa عليه السلام was horrified. He didn't mean to kill him. It was an accident. He realised Shaytan had influenced him at that moment. Feeling deep regret, he cried out to Allah:

رَبِّ إِنِّي ظَلَمْتُ نَفْسِي فَٱغْفِرْ لِي

"My Lord, I have wronged myself, so forgive me." (Surah al-Qasas: 16)

Allah, al-Ghafur (The All-Forgiving), forgave Musa عليه السلام as a result of his istighfar. Musa عليه السلام then promised Allah: "My Lord, because of the favour that You have done for me, I shall never support those who do evil." (Surah al-Qasas: 17)
